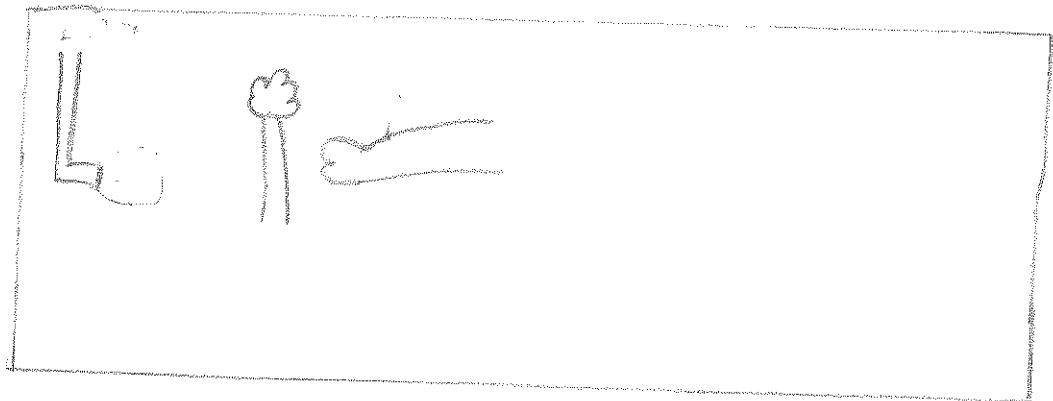

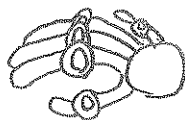

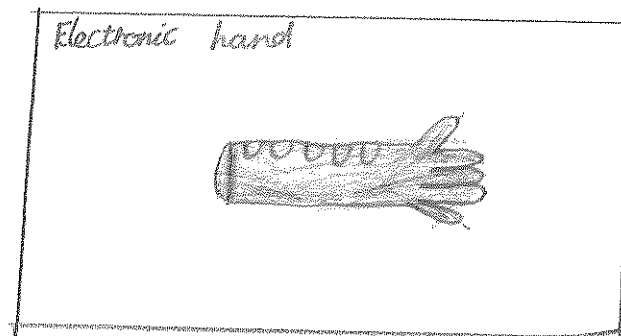
I learned that 9.5 million people died in WW1.

I also learned that doctors have improved limbs a lot.

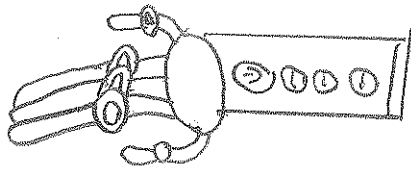
I learned that 40 thousand soldiers lost their limbs.
